More than 50% of stroke survivors have communication disorders.

This makes it difficult for staff and patients to communicate well together.


It affects how staff and patients feel.

It affects quality of care and rehabilitation.

#### COM-STAR aims to:

- 1) Understand current communication training options and training needs of staff.
- 2) Explore staff, patient and carer experiences of communicating.
- 3) Co-design a new freely available national staff communication training package.
- 4) Test the training package out in 4 NHS stroke services.

#### **HEADLINES**



We now **understand stroke staff experiences** of communicating with people with communication difficulties.

We have **heard stories** of how **communication difficulties** affect **patient care and experience**.

We have explored staff training needs.

We are almost ready to start co-designing the new communication training!

### What's been happening?

Huge thanks to the 606 stroke staff from around the UK who completed our survey!

We found:

Almost half of stroke staff do not receive communication training.

Staff want training to know how best to communicate with each individual patient.

We have **interviewed 12 people** with dysarthria, aphasia, cognitive communication disorder and family members.

We have **interviewed 11 staff** working with stroke survivors: Rehabilitation assistant, doctor, nurse, physio, OT, housekeeper, clinical psychologist, dietician.

Staff and stroke survivors were a diverse group from different areas of the UK.

We have made films of staff, patient and family experiences for our co-design work.

The team have left no stone unturned in the **literature on staff communication training!** We now know what has been tried before and what training techniques can help staff to

'communicate better to provide better care and better rehabilitation'



#### What's happening next?

We will use our learning from 'what's been happening' to co-design new communication training.

12 stroke staff and 6 patient and family members will meet across Sheffield and London between March and November 2025. They will design the content of the training.

Professor Chris McKevitt leads the COM-STAR PPI group.


Since our Summer newsletter our PPI group have been working hard:
