WRITING

Once you know what you want to write about, apply the ABC method - it provides a clear structure for discussing your experiences by first describing an **A**ction, then detailing the **B**enefit, and finally connecting it to the **C**ourse.

<p>ACTIVITY What you did</p>	<p>“In Year 12 I completed a research project on the role of women during WW1 in Britain”</p>
<p>BENEFIT Skills or knowledge you gained</p>	<p>“As well as providing me with historical knowledge, I was able to develop my research, communication and analytical skills”</p>
<p>COURSE Connect the skills and knowledge from the benefit stage to the course you are applying for</p>	<p>“During my research project, I did an in-depth analysis of my research findings and then wrote a 2,000-word essay. This will serve me well for studying a History degree, where I will need to write regular analytical essays as well as carry out my own research”</p>

TOP TIPS

- Proofread (several times and also after each edit), ask family and friends to proofread for you
- Be enthusiastic and positive throughout – don’t be afraid to show your best self!
- Link your examples to the course as much as possible
- If you are on a university access programme, you can add this as well, and say how you benefited from taking part
- Maximise all your characters! You have 4000 characters across 3 sections
- DO NOT PLAGIARISE! Your application may be rejected if you copy any element of someone else’s personal statement – current or previous
