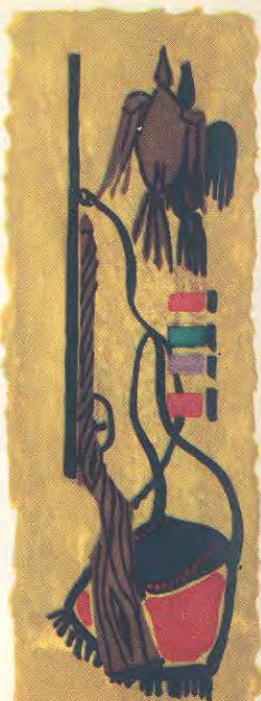


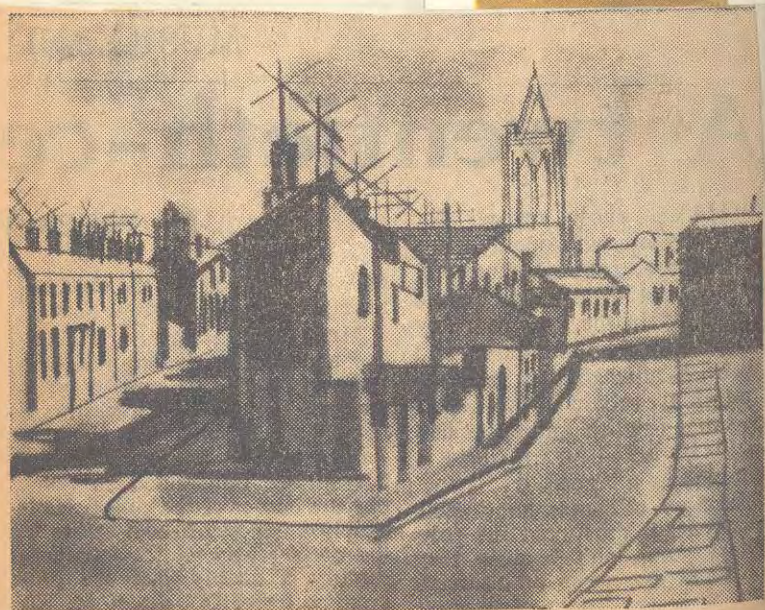

HOW IMMINENT is the danger that South Vietnam may fall to the Communists? How explosive is this trouble-spot, where the Americans may send in combat troops?

Tomorrow in *The Observer*, Dennis Bloodworth reports from the uneasy city of Saigon. Another Korea? Another Laos? In fact there are several new problems set by the stealthy invasion of South Vietnam by the Communist guerrillas, Vietcong.



Bloodworth describes the weapons and tactics of these night-time killers and abductors, and assesses the relative strengths of the opposing forces, and the weaknesses of the pro-Western administration. You should read his ahead-of-the-news report tomorrow. There is precious little here that anyone in the West can be apathetic about.

Two great outcasts

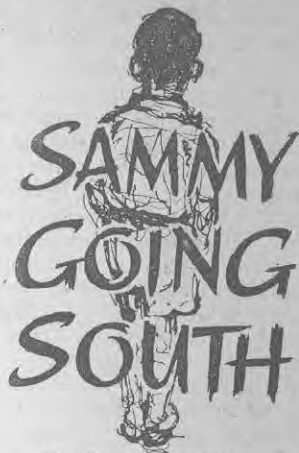

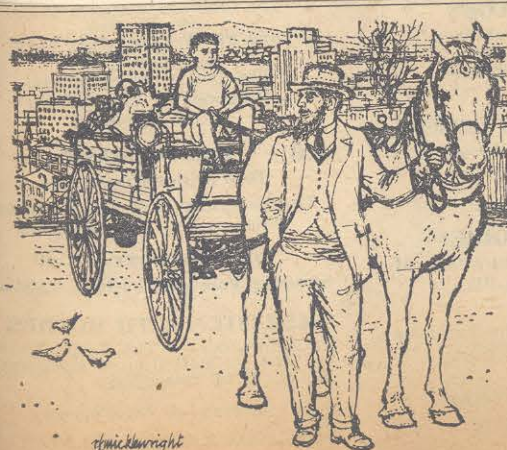
