## Imvelo ye Vuka uZenzele





Judy asked her neighbour

Judy and the community arrived at the offices. When they arrived they were very angry. When they arrived at the gate, they found Security Guard.

**Security Guard:** When you arrive as many as you are in the morning, how can we help you?

The whole community spoke, asking to speak to their leaders.

**Security Guard:** No people! The people you are looking for are not here.

Judy: You know I have been thinking for a while what to call it, we can call it "Vuka Uzenzele" ("Get up and do it yourself") because we have stand up for ourselves. Judy's Followers: Now, Judy, let's start this group called "Vuka Uzenzele" does that mean we can finally get water?

Judy: Yes, we will get water with this organisation and be happy.

**Judy's Followers:** Yes, Judy, we can trust you because you have fought for us before. We will support you in this group.

Judy and her followers, they finally became one team and found joy in the struggle/movement and got what they wanted.
